2008 Georgia Student Media Festival

The 2008 Georgia Student Media Festival was a tremendous success! The statewide



festival was held on Friday, April 25, 2008 at the headquarters of Georgia Public Broadcasting. Over 120 excited and helpful volunteers and judges descended on GPB for the day's event. Interim GPB Director, Patrice Weaver welcomed the group and said what a positive partnership GPB had had with GSMF over the years. She hoped the partnership would continue indefinitely!

Over 960 projects were received for the State Festival. This represents the work of more than 3400 + students. The quality of projects continues to improve each year. The estimate is that more than half of the entries will likely advance to International Student Media Festival. GSMF is coordinated by Deborah Gray, Gwinnett County Schools, Michelle Lenderman, Bibb County Schools, and Dr. Gordon Baker, Clayton State University.

Impact on student learning – teacher comments:

Students kept weekly vocabulary logs, summaries, and personal responses. These activities helped students monitor comprehension and make connections. As a culminating project, students created a PowerPoint, a storyboard or a book-in-a-box project, and included information about the characters, plot events and their personal responses to the story. Culminating projects allowed students to share their learning experiences with their peers and their teacher. Audio recordings of the texts aided students' reading comprehension and fluency. Playaways were a valuable tool for teaching independent reading skills. Students were encouraged to become actively involved and engaged readers.


PlayAway Audio Book Survey Student results

(based on surveys completed by 53 students)






2. It was easy to listen to the audio book and follow in the printed book. (Mean response = 4.64)

Recommendations for improvements:

- 1. One problem that I encountered with two titles was the print version of the book that I purchased did not match the Playaway audio book edition. If your intent is to have students listen to the audio and read along in the print copy then make sure your editions match.
- 2. Purchase cataloging with the audiobooks.
- 3. Purchase a package of extra earbuds for use when the original sets wear out.
- 4. Purchase alcohol pads for cleaning the earbuds.
- 5. Inspect and make sure each audiobook works correctly when it arrives. We had one that was defective upon arrival.
- 6. We received two styles of Playaways and the training we designed for students only covered one of the styles. Check the style prior to planning/implementing training.
- 7. Teachers who implemented the grant project indicated that they need to create a greater variety of activities for students to complete while reading the book. For example, students reading the same novel could create a booktalk or students could create a blog and post weekly comments and also invite other students to comment.

Mini-Grant Recipient #2

Dear GAIT Grant Committee,

Thank you for awarding this technology grant to benefit our students. The grant money was used to purchase two computers to set up and promote a college and career center for our students. This entailed multiple activities:

1. SAT Online

Becky Thomas from the Georgia Department of Education was asked to come out to our school to inservice our entire faculty on the Georgia SAT Online program. The teachers were trained and introduced to the program during their training periods in one of our computer labs. I assisted Ms. Thomas with the training and the teachers became familiar with the program, printing off access codes for their students. The Media Center followed this up by offering teachers the opportunity to sign up their individual classes to come to the library so students could become acquainted with the SAT Online program.

2. Scholarship Club and Resources

Originally, I had written my GAIT grant to use the computers for setting up a career and college area to be promoted and used by a college advisor, Ms. Smiley, with our students in the library. The PTSA had previously funded her services to help counsel the students individually in understanding their options and making college choices. This service was discontinued by our PTSA at the beginning of the 2007-2008 school year. Ms. Smiley still had an interest in continuing her work on a volunteer basis in the Media Center, however, by establish a scholarship club that met after school in the Media Center. Working with Ms. Smiley, I purchased college guides as requested by Ms. Smiley so we could promote these resources to the club and other students. Ms. Smiley provided me with scholarship information to go up on our school's website which I updated frequently. This website provided links which were promoted to the scholarship club in meetings that were held bimonthly in the library after school. Approximately 25 students attended each club meeting.

3. Career/College Center Marketing

The counseling office and our head counselor provided me with resources to set up a display for our career/counseling center. Dr. England, our head counselor, tutored me on the important websites to promote. I set up displays around the computers using tiered racks with books and information sheets for the students to use. The computers were designated for using these specific sites; USATestprep, SAT Online, GAcollege411, CareerCruising, FastWeb, the Occupational Outlook Handbook, SAT/ ACT registration, and browsing college websites. The displays helped to promote the site as students often came before school, during lunch time, and after school to use the computers to register for SAT/ACT, USA Test Prep, college applications, etc. The Counseling Department also sent students down to use these computers as their own computers were tied up for use by students taking online courses throughout the day.

4. Career and College Booklet

Again, working with the advice of our head counselor, we created an attractive booklet for our career center. The booklet was intended to provide a guide to the websites that were recommended by Ms. Smiley and our head counselor. Each page in the booklet described a specific website, providing passwords, and other pertinent information to guide our students. (It also helped the media staff as it provided a quick reference guide which we could refer to as needed, so we could become familiar with these sites and promote them!)

5. Registering on FastWeb

In order to learn FastWeb, I registered myself for scholarships on the FastWeb website. By putting in my criteria, I got a sense of the site and what it offered our students. I now receive emails tailored to my criteria on scholarships opportunities that I can avail myself of if desired. The emails are helpful to me as they continue to remind me to recommend this service to our students and classes.
